

MINUTES of the Regular Meeting of
the City Council of the City of Rye held in

Councilman Hutchings made a motion, seconded by Councilwoman Cunningham, to adjourn into executive session to discuss personnel matters at 6:00 P.M.

The Council reconvened at 8:00 P.M.

1. Pledge of Allegiance

Mayor Otis invited the audience to join the council in the Pledge of Allegiance.

2. Roll Call

Mayor Otis called the meeting to order; a quorum was present to conduct official city business.

3. Residents may be heard who have matters to discuss that do not appear on the agenda

Mrs. Bobbi Billington, 740 Old Milton Road, respectfully requested a rain date of Sunday, April 9th for the Little League Parade and festivities scheduled for Saturday, April 8th. Mrs. Billington informed the council that Lt. Falk, Rye Police Department, said it would not be a problem if the Little League provided at least six adults to assist with the traffic at various intersections during this event.

The council discussed the problem of granting a rain date for the Little League since the Rye Derby, sponsored by the YMCA, and the Multiple Sclerosis Walkathon are scheduled for April 9th.

Councilman Hutchings suggested that the Little League consider excluding the parade and concentrate on the festivities.

Both Mr. Thomas Fendler and Mr. Mack Cunningham, representatives of the Rye YMCA, had reservations about having the Little League parade on Sunday because it might interfere with the registration of the participants and preparation for the Derby.

The Council approved the rain date for the parade, pending the Little League having further discussion with the Rye YMCA to resolve the aforementioned concerns.

4. Presentation of the City of Rye Recreation Master Plan

Mayor Otis introduced Mr. Stephen Meyers, chairman of the Rye Recreation Commission, Mr. Michael Gansfuss, chairman of the Recreation Master Plan Steering Committee, and Mr. Patrick Cleary, Cleary Consulting, who presented the City of Rye Recreation Master Plan.

Mr. Meyers explained that the Master Plan is a document which contains details, recommendations, and analysis of recreational facilities, programs, and services and is the framework for future planning. He informed the audience that an Executive Summary of the Master Plan is available.

Mr. Meyers outlined the strategic plan's goals and objectives and stressed the following three priorities:

1. development of a 6-1/2 mile Rye Scenic Trailway System,
2. renovation of the Damiano Center, and
3. creation of four additional athletic fields.

Mr. Michael Gansfuss explained the process for the Master Plan as follows:

- This long range strategic plan is the culmination of a two-year planning process.
- The Request for Proposals was publicized. Cleary Consulting was awarded the bid and engaged to provide an analysis of the city's recreational facilities.
- This Master Plan reflects the input and involvement of a broad cross-section of the community. Public involvement in the comprehensive planning process included the oversight of the Steering Committee manned by an array of representatives involved in local recreation, focus groups

which met in public to discuss the plan, and a citizen survey which was mailed to every household in the city.

Mr. Patrick Cleary discussed the following:

Trends and issues:

- Demographic trends indicate that local programs and youth sport leagues are expanding, while facilities remain static.
- More senior citizens and young children are participating in programs.
- "Youth at risk" has emerged as a target group.
- There is a demand for specialized programs.
- There is an expectation of residents that participation will not be limited by lack of fields, facilities, space, staff, and equipment.

Potential improvements:

- **Damiano Center:**
 1. expand facility and parking,
 2. install an underground irrigation system to allow for regular and efficient watering of the fields,
 3. improve parking at the tennis courts, increase parking at the McDonald Building, and create a parking lot at Goldwin Street, and
 4. construct a new sitting area/garden.
- **Disbrow Park:**
 1. relocate access driveway,
 2. develop new athletic fields,
 3. create a walkway to connect the park with Thorne Place,
 4. add parking space near Sterling Field,
 5. construct a picnic area at Feeley Field,
 6. create an attractive area with benches and plantings in the southeast corner of the park adjacent to Blind Brook and Oakland Beach Avenue.
- **Gagliardo Park:**

1. review parking on the High Street side of the park,
2. maintain playgrounds and a picnic pavillion, and
3. add a landscaped buffer to abate noise from I-95.

Mr. Cleary indicated that the following six sites were discussed as potential field options:

1. Disbrow Park,
2. Playland,
3. NYS Thruway Authority property,
4. Osborn School,
5. Milton School, and
6. the Rye Nursery property.

Recommendations for increasing the use of fields:

- develop agreements with clubs and private owners for first right to purchase land,
- install lights for night games to expand the use of existing fields, and
- invest in artificial turf.

A question and answer period followed with discussion on:

- the proposed scenic trailway route,
- parking,
- maintenance of existing fields,
- field space and land acquisition, and
- wetland concerns.

Mr. Meyers summarized the presentation by pointing out the importance of maintaining existing and future fields. He stated he will work to make this report a reality. He expressed his appreciation to the residents of Rye for their input, which demonstrates that they are very concerned about recreational issues. He congratulated everyone for their team effort in achieving this plan and thanked the council members for their interest. Mr. Meyers announced that the Plan and the summary are available at the Rye Free Reading Room and at the Recreation Department.

Mayor Otis expressed his appreciation to everyone involved in the development of this Master Plan. He commended all involved for their dedication and interest in community recreation.

5. Presentation of schematic designs for Milton Firehouse Renovation Project

Mayor Otis introduced Mr. Mark Weisman, Kaestle Boos Associates, Inc., presenter of the schematic designs for the Milton Firehouse. He said working with Interim City Manager Christopher J. Bradbury, Councilman McKean, Mr. Greg Sands of Calgi, Inc., the Board of Architectural Review and the Landmarks Advisory Committee has been a team effort. Mr. Weisman emphasized that the historic significance of the building will be preserved.

A series of schematic drawings of the site and floor plans illustrated the following:

- the single story south wing will be demolished,
- a new addition will be erected to house the apparatus and will allow drive-through capability,
- traffic on Park Lane will be one-way for vehicles,
- first floor will accommodate the apparatus, new dormitory, day room, and storage,
- upper floor will be designated for meeting rooms, kitchen, and bathroom facilities,
- exterior fire escapes will be eliminated and an elevator will be installed,
- new addition will be pushed to the back of the firehouse, and
- the bottom floor will be elevated to prevent flooding.

A question and answer period focused on:

- schedule for renovation,
- cost estimates and staying within budget for the renovation of both fire houses,
- operating and maintenance expenses, and
- the cost of this project compared to the original budget.

Mayor Otis complimented Mr. Weisman for his presentation and everyone who has been involved in the process.

6. Resolution proclaiming April 28, 2000 as Arbor Day in the City of Rye

Mayor Otis acknowledged the March 31, 2000 memorandum from City Naturalist Chantal Detlefs requesting that April 28, 2000 be proclaimed as Arbor Day in the City of Rye.

Councilwoman Larr made a motion, seconded by Councilman Hutchings and unanimously carried, to adopt the following resolution:

WHEREAS, Arbor Day is now observed throughout the nation and the world, and

WHEREAS, trees can reduce soil erosion, moderate the temperature, clean the air, produce oxygen and provide habitat for wildlife, and

WHEREAS, trees in our City increase property values, enhance the economic vitality of business areas, and beautify our community, and

WHEREAS, trees are a source of joy and spiritual renewal, and

WHEREAS, the City of Rye has been recognized as a Tree City USA by The National Arbor Day Foundation and desires to continue its tree-planting ways,

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Steven Otis, Mayor of the City of Rye, do hereby proclaim April 28, 2000 as ARBOR DAY in the City of Rye, and I urge all citizens to support efforts to care for our trees and woodlands, and to support our City's community forestry program, and

FURTHER, I urge all citizens to plant trees to gladden the hearts and promote the well-being of present and future generations.

7. Resolution proclaiming April 29, 2000 as Rye Lacrosse Day in the City of Rye

Councilwoman Larr made a motion, seconded by Councilwoman Downing and unanimously carried, to adopt the following resolution:

WHEREAS, lacrosse is the oldest game of the North American continent, and

WHEREAS, lacrosse by reason of culture and tradition has become a very popular recreational and competitive sport, and

WHEREAS, today's youngsters learn skills, fundamental techniques, and sportsmanship from playing this game, and

WHEREAS, the City of Rye recognizes everyone who is committed to assist or participate in lacrosse, the fastest sport on foot,

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Steven Otis, Mayor of the City of Rye, on behalf of the City Council, do hereby, proclaim April 29, 2000 as Rye Lacrosse Day in the City of Rye.

8. Public Hearing on proposed local law amending Section 167-15 of Chapter 167, Streets and Sidewalks, of the Rye Code by extending and continuing a Moratorium Related to the Use of the City's Rights-of-Way

Mayor Otis referenced Corporation Counsel J. Henry Neale's March 9, 2000 memorandum on the extension of the right-of-way moratorium.

The Mayor opened the public hearing.

There being no one to address this proposed local law, the Mayor closed the public hearing.

Councilwoman Cunningham made a motion, seconded by Councilman Hutchings, to adopt the following local law:

**CITY OF RYE
LOCAL LAW NO. 3-00**

**A local law amending Chapter 167,
Streets and Sidewalks,
of the Rye City Code Section 167-15,
by extending and continuing a
Moratorium Related to the Use of
The City's Rights-of-Way**

Be it enacted by the Council of the City of Rye as follows:

Section 1. Chapter 167, Streets and Sidewalks, of the Rye City Code, Section 167-15, creating a Moratorium Related to the Use of the City's Rights-of-Way, is hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 167-15. Moratorium Related to the Use of the City's Rights-of-Way.

There is hereby enacted a sixty (60) day moratorium on the issuance of authorization by the City of Rye on applications for the construction or reconstruction or rebuilding of wireline facilities in the city's rights-of-way; and the moratorium previously enacted is continued and extended for a period beginning April 10, 2000 and continuing until June 9, 2000.

Section 2. This law shall take effect immediately on filing in the office of the Secretary of State.

The local law was adopted.

9. Consideration of request for approval to construct an 18 inch high stone retaining wall within the area of the city owned right-of-way near 80 Davis Avenue and authorization for the Interim City Manager to enter into a license agreement with Grace Associates LLC for this purpose

Mayor Otis referenced Corporation Counsel J. Henry Neale's March 16, 2000 memorandum regarding the request and accompanying documentation on behalf of Grace Associates LLC, for approval of a license agreement that would allow construction of an 18-inch high stone retaining wall within the area of the city's right-of-way near 80 Davis Avenue. The Mayor also acknowledged the letter dated April 5, 2000 from Ms. Cynthia K. Pode, a resident of 21 Ann Lane, who objected to the wall.

This agenda item was initially discussed at the March 29, 2000 council meeting. There was no council action because Councilman Stampleman questioned whether or not the wall was already constructed.

Matthew A. Bovoso, Esq., McCullough, Goldberger & Staudt, represented his client, Mr. Robert C. Howard, who constructed the retaining wall without a license agreement with the city. Mr. Bovoso respectfully requested a license agreement because his client discussed this matter with the Building and Engineering Departments and concluded that he had all the necessary sanctions, and that a license agreement was not required.

A discussion ensued on Mr. Howard's requesting a license agreement as an afterthought.

It was decided that the council would inspect the property, taking into consideration Mrs. Poda's concerns. The City Council scheduled a special meeting for April 8, 2000 preceding the joint meeting with the Rye City School District, to resolve this issue.

10. Discussion of the city assuming ownership of Midland Avenue from the County of Westchester

This agenda item was deferred to a future council meeting.

11. Adoption of County tax rate for 2000

Mayor Otis acknowledged the March 24, 2000 memorandum from City Comptroller Michael A. Genito regarding the adoption of county tax rate for 2000.

Councilwoman Cunningham made a motion, seconded by Councilwoman Larr, to adopt the following resolution:

RESOLVED, that the tax rates for the amounts of County, Blind Brook Sewer District, Mamaroneck Valley Sewer District and Refuse Disposal District charges for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2000, shall be as follows:

RESOLVED, that the tax warrant of the County be signed by the Mayor and directed to the City Comptroller to collect the amount of said taxes with interest as provided by law and any special assessment heretofore authorized and approved.

Bradbury regarding approval of a supplemental appropriation of \$2,300.00 from the Police Agency Fund to the Police Department budget for the purpose of purchasing an exercise bike for the Police Department's exercise weight room.

Councilman Hutchings made a motion, seconded by Councilwoman Downing to adopt the following resolution:

RESOLVED, that the City Council of the City of Rye hereby approves an appropriation of \$2,300.00 from the Miscellaneous Trust Fund - Donations for Police Purposes - for the purchase of an exercise bike for the Police Department.

Councilman McKean made a motion, seconded by Councilwoman Cunningham and unanimously carried, to approve the request of the Rye Chamber of Commerce, d/b/a The Rye Merchants Association, to hold a sidewalk sale from Thursday, July 27, 2000 to Saturday, July 29, 2000.

14. One appointment to the Conservation Commission/Advisory Council to fill the term ending January 1, 2002, by the Mayor with Council approval

Mayor Otis discussed whether it would be a violation of the Code of Ethics for two family members to serve on the same board. After research and discussion, the council agreed that this would not pose a problem.

Councilwoman Cunningham made a motion, seconded by Councilman McKean and unanimously carried, to approve the Mayor's appointment of Ms. Kara Murphy to the Conservation Commission/Advisory Council to fill the term ending January 1, 2002.

15. Bids for One (1) Horizontal Grinder

Mayor Otis referenced the March 29, 2000 memorandum from City Engineer George J. Mottarella recommending that Westchester Ford Tractor Inc. be awarded Bid #2-00 for the One (1) Horizontal Grinder.
